MUSC's Senior Mentorship Program pairs medical students with elderly residents to provide medical support, showcasing the institution's commitment to holistic education. With this program, future doctors will receive valuable training on how to care for older patients, reducing stigmas around aging and the elderly. Students practice meeting elderly patients in a non-clinical setting and assessing different health markers, while also improving their bedside manner. USC School of Medicine is highly competitive, with only 99 students accepted out of nearly 3,000 applications in the Fall 2020 class. The majority of these students came from within South Carolina. MUSC has seen impressive residency match results, with 97.7% of Class of 2021 senior applicants matched in a residency position. USC School of Medicine is nationally ranked #90 in Research and #76 in Primary Care by US News.
