Puppy pads or disposable indoor potty solutions can help until your pet becomes reliable. Gradually transition them from using these options to going outside as needed. Keep Your Puppy Close When moving through hallways and elevators, keep a close eye on your puppy to prevent accidents in high-traffic areas. If your puppy's too young to hold it in or looks like they need to go really bad, consider carrying them so you don't have accidents where people walk. This way, when you get to the spot for going pee, everything goes smoothly. Pee pads can be helpful if you're training a puppy and live in an apartment. They give your puppy a special place to go inside when you can't take them outside right away. But it's key to use them smart: First, start by putting the pee pads somewhere specific. As your puppy gets better at going pee outside, move the pads closer to the door so they learn to go outside too. Always put the pads in the same spot, so your puppy knows where to go when they need to inside. And make sure to change the pee pads often, so it's clean and comfy for your puppy. You can also try using puppy litter boxes or fake grass spots. These things help make it feel like going outside, which makes it easier for your puppy to understand where to go. You can slowly teach them to go outside instead of on the special spot. Don't get too mad if your puppy has accidents - they're just part of learning. Instead, focus on giving lots of praise when they do go pee in the right place. With patience and practice, your puppy will get better at going pee where you want them to. Some extra tools that might help with apartment potty training are crates (which keep your puppy safe and clean), a special area for them to play but not get into trouble, an umbilical cord leash so they can't wander off when you're at home, or even a bell they can ring to tell you they need to go outside.
